From the Board Room

Dear BCS District Residents:

It has been great to have all of our students back to school for a full schedule of academics, sports, and extracurriculars this year. A primary focus of this year has been to identify any gaps in learning from the past two years of educational disruptions due to the pandemic. Supplemental resources, funded largely with federal stimulus money, have been implemented this year to assist with assessment and remediation designed to catch up students to the extent possible.

Your Board of Education is pleased to submit the proposed budget for the 2022-2023 school year in the pages of this Banner for your review. This budget was designed to maintain all of the programs that have been in place this year. The supplemental resources mentioned above will also be extended another year as we seek to bring all students up to speed. (The federal stimulus funds and staffing are not included as part of this budget review and vote.)



You will note that the expense budget for next year increases 3.26% over the current year, well below the recent cost of living increases we have seen. The expense budget is what we vote on every year. The tax levy is planned to increase 3.9%, but the actual property tax rate is anticipated to be slightly less than in 2020. You are likely well aware that School District revenue from the power plant has dropped dramatically from when it was in full operation. The District has applied for and has been approved for special state funding from the Energy Cessation Mitigation Fund. This will help us to close the budget gap in the near term, but this funding phases out over seven years. Therefore, we still need to increase the tax levy modestly to ensure the long-term financial health of the School District. Our state aid has been increasing as NYS is finally correcting the under-funding of foundation aid to reflect the greatly reduced wealth of the District with the closing of the power plant.

At the beginning of the current school year, the school board created two new ad hoc committees to include community members to offer input to both the budget process and long-term facilities planning. The budget herein reflects the input and approval of the budget committee. The facilities committee meets every other month and plans to develop a list of building renovations and improvements for voter consideration, likely in December 2022.

Your school board and administration have been focused for years on resolving the long-term financial deficit due to the closure of the power plant and related loss of tax revenue. We have made great progress in this regard and our five-year financial model shows that our need to tap reserves to close budgets has nearly been eliminated, given what we know today. You may have noted a news report this year that the Barker School District was identified by the state as "susceptible to financial stress". That was based on the fact that we have had to draw down reserves for nine years in a row due to the structural deficit we faced. This designation will not apply next year or likely in the foreseeable future.

The investment this school year in energy saving technology (replacing older lighting with LED fixtures, updating heating controls and equipment, and weatherstripping) will pay dividends for many years. We are already seeing a significant savings in our electricity consumption as compared to pre-COVID times.

The new solar panel installation, west of the elementary school, will be coming online soon. This will provide at least 25 years of solar power to largely offset our annual needs, saving the District about \$1.4 million over the life of the project in exchange for the use of about four acres of school property to host the project.


About three years ago, we adopted a strategic plan for the School District, including updated Mission, Vision and Foundational Values statements. In addition, four fundamental goals were adopted:

- Increase student engagement and learning
- Improve/increase the well-being of the school community
- Increase student investment in the community
- Reach a balanced budget that is sustainable for the future

Each goal has specific actions outlined to support it and all of this can be found on the District website. We have recently been reviewing the significant progress in all of these areas, with plans to identify any appropriate adjustments over the summer. The strategic plan is an important tool to focus our decision-making for the District.

In closing, I would like to thank again our school administration, faculty, and all staff for their dedication and flexibility in navigating the many challenges of the past 2+ years due to the pandemic. Thanks also to our families and students for working with us to adapt to the many changes required along the way. We cannot predict whether we will see any similar resurgence in the future, but if we continue to pull together, we can work through any obstacles to give our community the best learning environment possible.

Dear Barker Community,

Special Education

In the last issue of *The Banner*, I shared the process for the Committee on Preschool Special Education and the Committee on Special Education. In this edition, I'd like to provide information about Early Intervention (EI). Children up to 3 years of age are eligible for services through EI, based on the child's need, through their county of residence.

The research has shown us how important the infancy and toddler years are to a child's growth and development. The El program is a statewide program that provides many different types of early intervention services to identified infants and



toddlers with a developmental delay or disability and to their families. If you suspect your child might need additional help with their speech, their motor skills (moving from place to place or climbing stairs), or their cognitive understanding (skills your brain uses to think, read, learn, remember, reason, and pay attention) the first step would be to reach out to your pediatrician and consult with them. Your pediatrician can share with you the different milestones as children grow. If your child seems to be in need of EI services, please don't hesitate to call the county. The earlier intervention can be provided, the better it is for children. Children in EI are eligible to receive services year-round.

Instruction

As we move closer to the end of the school year, I reflect back on everything we've done this past year. First, and most importantly, it was exciting to see all students back in the building for 5 days per week. Some of our students were more excited than they've ever been to return to school! In our Elementary School, we are seeing students make huge gains in literacy and numeracy. In the Jr.-Sr. High School students are moving forward with their academic careers and are one step closer to graduation. The June Regents exams signal another return to pre-pandemic "normal".

Despite the pandemic, the District has moved forward with several programs and updates. A Technology Committee met to update the District Technology Plan. This was submitted to the New York State Education Department in February and we are awaiting feedback from them. The Instructional Cabinet continues to

work on the Comprehensive District Education Plan, which is focused on the Board of Education's goals. The Resource Review Committee has spent the year meeting to look at different resource options for Elementary Literacy and Math. Changes to the resources we use and instruction will move forward starting during the 2022-2023 school year. We continue to use FastBridge as a screening and benchmark assessment for K-12 students in Math and Reading. This benchmark data helps us shape instruction and guides us on curricular changes and updates. As we move into the summer, we will continue to work hard to provide your child(ren) with the best education possible.

Barker Central School Kitchen Sees Overhaul

This year the kitchen in the Jr.-Sr. High School is seeing an overhaul. Through a series of grants, including the National School Lunch Program Equipment Grant, the District was able to purchase two new combination ovens, a new convection oven, a new countertop refrigerator, two mobile warming carts, and a new serving line. These new purchases will replace equipment that is at least 40 years old and will allow us to cook food faster and continue to follow the Department of Health food safety guidelines. The first combination oven was delivered and installed on April 1st and the new serving line was installed the week of April break. The other two ovens are scheduled to arrive in early summer. As you can see from the photo above, Mrs. Fuerch is pretty excited about the upgrades.

Annual Budget Vote

Tuesday, May 17, 2022 12:00 PM to 8:00 PM Herbert F. Ludwig Fine Arts Hall

There are three (3) propositions that you may vote on this year at the annual meeting of qualified voters to be held on Tuesday, May 17, 2022, from 12:00 PM – 8:00 PM prevailing time in the Herbert F. Ludwig Fine Arts Hall (auditorium) of the District.

Proposition #1 - Budget

Shall the Barker Central School District Board of Education, Niagara County, New York be authorized to spend the sum of \$17,817,534 in the total amount set forth in the proposed Budget during the 2022-2023 school year and to levy the necessary tax.

Proposition #2 - Barker Central School District Board Members

To elect two (2) members of the Board for a 3-year term commencing July 1, 2022 and expiring on June 30, 2025, to succeed Mary Jo Clemens-Harris and Heather Ecker whose terms expire on June 30, 2022.

Candidates are listed in order they will appear on the ballot: Richard Weller, Jennifer Ellnor Harris, Deanna Weeks Carnes, Charles Stodolka.

You may review their bios on pages 10 and 11.

You may vote for two individuals.

Proposition #3 - Public Library

Shall the funding for the Barker Public Library, which is raised by annual levy of a tax upon the taxable real property within the Barker Central School District be increased from \$79,590 to \$81,182. This is an increase of \$1,592.

Qualifications of a Voter

You qualify as a voter if: you are a citizen of the United States; you have been a resident of the Barker Central School District for at least 30 days prior to the school budget vote and election held on May 17, 2022; you are at least eighteen (18) years of age; you are qualified to register for an election in accordance with Section 5-106 of the Election Law. In addition, you do not need to be a property owner to be eligible to vote.

Detailed Explanation of Expenditure Categories

General Support consists of:

Board of Education, Central Administration, Finance, Staff, and Special Items. This also includes Maintenance and Operation of Plant, (including all maintenance and grounds salaries, supplies and materials, and utilities), Central Printing/Mailing, and Central Data Processing.



Instruction consists of:

Instructional Administration and Improvement (principal's salary and supplies, curriculum development, research and planning, and professional development for all professional staff), Teaching Regular School (all regular school teaching salaries, supplies and materials, equipment, textbooks, and BOCES services for regular students, including Occupational Education), School Library and Audiovisual, Technology Services, Attendance, Guidance, Health Services, Psychological Services, Extra-classroom Activities, Athletics, and Special Education (special education teacher salaries, supplies and materials, textbooks, CSE and CPSE Committee expenses, contractual costs, private schools tuition, and BOCES special education costs).

Pupil Transportation consists of:

All bussing and fuel.

Community Services consists of:

Summer School and Adult Education.

Undistributed consists of:

Employer contributions to the employees' and the teachers' retirement systems, social security, workers' compensation premiums, unemployment insurance, health insurance, and terminal leave payments. It also includes payments of principal and interest on school bond payments and the capital outlay project.

Martell Secures Chemistry Grant

Mrs. Loriann Martell, chemistry teacher, recently received a grant provided by the American Chemistry Society, in the amount of \$2,550, and another \$500 donation from VanDeMark Chemical. Mrs. Martell, along with Andy Poss, a member of the American Chemical Society and the Barker community worked together as part of the ACS mentor/outreach program to develop new labs to utilize the grant money. They were tasked with finding chemical and kid appropriate high school labs that would help to promote chemical education. New equipment was purchased to replace old equipment that would help better prepare students for college level chemistry upon entrance. The grant and donation money is also being used to help fill in gaps caused by COVID. Some of the equipment purchased included: distillation apparatus, two heating units, hot plates, general chemical equipment, and chemicals to be used with the new equipment.

The BCS Board of Education had to approve all donations. Mrs. Martell would like to extend her gratitude to Mr. Poss, the American Chemical Society, and VanDeMark

Chemical for all of their assistance and support of chemical education at Barker Central School.

Class Constructs Rowing Machine

Students in Mr. Mallon's Principles of Engineering class spent much of the 3rd quarter designing an exercise machine. Using only materials that were already on hand in the technology rooms they were tasked with designing and building a working rowing machine. Working through the engineering design process students first listed their assets, namely 10 pound weight plates from an old universal exercise machine, perforated angle iron, a seat from an old lawn tractor, and miscellaneous bits of metal and hardware. They then sketched out

possible ideas, analyzed and measured existing exercise

equipment, and plotted out their course of action.

Identifying and addressing the many elements of the project was arguably the most challenging part. Covering a large white board with lists of things that needed to be done, they set about deciding what order to do them and who would do what. Certain parts of the machine needed to be cleaned up and refinished (the seat and seat frame) while others had to be manufactured from scratch using the metal lathe and milling machine (weight adjustment bar). Putting it all together and making it work for people of different heights was the final part of the design challenge.

Working a problem, from idea through the entire engineering design process, to completed machine, is quite an accomplishment. The students had to make critical decisions and act on them every day. One School, One Book

In March, and to recognize Dr. Seuss' birthday month and the Read Across America event, Mrs. Diane DeMarco and Mrs. Amanda Cottle organized a week of fun-filled activities. "Hats Off to Reading" and "Read Across America" activity booklets were provided for teachers to share with their students. Word searches, coloring pages, and making a Dr. Seuss hat were just some of the fun ideas provided on the activity pages. - **Grade 3: Antarctic Iceberg** Students visited Challenge Island's Antarctic Iceberg. Amidst all the fun, each visitor learned about the location, climate, and natural habitats of the continent of Antarctica, which is home to adorable penguins. Tribes discovered penguins' distinct physical features and learned about the physical and behavioral adaptations that help penguins stay warm in the frigid climate and how they move through the snow (waddling, hopping, and tobogganing). Teams designed a penguin toboggan ride using their knowledge of inclined planes and potential/kinetic energy. The challenge was to design a toboggan that decreased run times by reducing friction and maximizing velocity.
- **Grade 4: Tiger Fairway** Teams learned about Tiger Woods, how he started playing golf at a very early age, and about his amazing achievements. Tiger is a great example of how perseverance and dedication to a sport is really important if you want to be the best in the world. The task for each tribe was to design and build a mini golf course similar to one that Tiger would have played on as a child. After working through the design process the course was opened up to the public.
- Grade 5: Solar System Stabile Students traveled to outer space and learned about the Solar System and what objects are in our universe. Teams were introduced to the concept of Balance Points and used craft sticks to demonstrate the concept. The teams learned about the famous artist Alexander Calder who used balance to create moving art called a stabile. Each team worked together to design a Calder-style stabile using the planets and the sun.
- Grade 6: Cool Careers Mechanical Engineering Orange Grove Students became mechanical engineers for the day and learned about the mechanical engineer's role on an orange grove, from picking, sorting, and packing. The project for each team to complete was to engineer their own sorting machine that sorted oranges based on size as they move through the machine. The engineers designed, tested, and improved their machines to complete the challenge.


