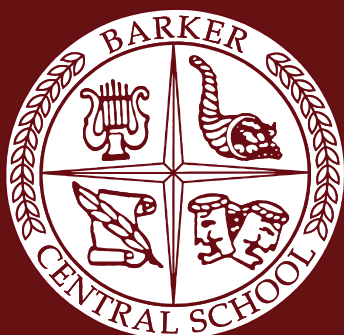

To Barker CSD Families & Students,

Hello Barker families. Despite the many challenges our District has faced over the last two years, we are proud to say that Barker CSD is forging ahead. Our students have been doing an excellent job returning to a five day week, all while learning and growing as members of our school community. We wanted to take this opportunity to update everyone on a few items as we move into the second half of the school year.

The primary focus from an instructional standpoint has been to assess and address the skill gaps students may have from the previous two years of interrupted instruction. Teachers at all grade levels have been doing this since the first week of school. Utilizing our academic intervention service providers as well as differentiating instruction in these areas at the early grades, we are already seeing meaningful improvement.

The interruptions to regular school have also been difficult in non-instructional ways. These issues can manifest differently: socially, emotionally, or behaviorally. We have brought on extra counseling support a few days per week. This includes the addition of a social worker and a behavioral specialist. We hope that with these additional supports we can work with students and families to effectively address these issues.

We are also happy to return to many regular school events. We had the first Homecoming week since 2019, including a pep rally, parade, and dance. We also recently celebrated Halloween with a parent event in October that also involved our fantastic Music Department. Our 7th and 8th grade students did a turkey trot through the village before Thanksgiving break. As we get into the holiday season, our Music Department will be returning to student performances in the auditorium. We are happy to bring these school spirit events back.

Thank you to everyone for your patience and support. It has not been easy, but this year has proven that Barker has bounced back.

From the Desk of Dr. Kramer

Dear Barker Community,

Recently, there have been a lot of questions around special education, the referral process, and what happens if a student is classified as a student in need of special education services. Our goal is to make this process as easy as possible for students and families. Therefore, we want to take some time, clarify, and answer questions.

There are actually three separate committees that meet on children regarding special education.

1. **Early Intervention (EI).** Children up to 3 years of age are eligible for services through EI, based on the child's need, through their county of residence. If you suspect your child might need additional help with their speech, their motor skills (moving from place to place or climbing stairs), or their cognitive understanding (skills your brain uses to think, read, learn, remember, reason, and pay attention), please don't hesitate to call the county. The earlier intervention can be provided, the better it is for children. Children in EI are eligible to receive services year-round.
2. **Committee on Preschool Special Education (CPSE).** Once children reach 3 years of age, they transition from EI to CPSE, a committee comprised of both school and county staff. If students are already in EI, the school will be notified and the transition will be completed by outside providers. If you are concerned about a child who did not receive services before the age of three, a request for evaluation must be made to the school. This request must be in writing and can be mailed or emailed to the Director of Instructional Services. All new referrals will follow the process outlined below. Students receive services during the school year (September-June); summer services are available if the child has regressed or not shown progress during the year.
3. **Committee on Special Education (CSE).** Once students reach Kindergarten age, they are now served by the CSE. Unlike the EI to CPSE transition, the CPSE to CSE transition is done by either outside providers or the district. For students who are new referrals, the request for evaluation would be sent, in writing, to the Director of Instructional Services and follows the process outlined below. Students receive services during the school year (September-June); summer services are available if the child has regressed or not shown progress during the year.



THE FIVE STEPS OF THE SPECIAL EDUCATION PROCESS

1. Initial Referral for Special Education Services
2. Individual Evaluation Process
3. Determining Eligibility for Special Education Services
4. Individualized Education Program (IEP)
5. Implementation & Annual Review/Reevaluation

STEP 1. INITIAL REFERRAL FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICES

If your school-aged child is having difficulty in school, you may wish to first talk to the teacher. We offer additional classroom supports to help students who may be behind expectations. These services are called "Response to Intervention" services or "RTI services." However, you may also choose to refer your child—in writing—to the school's Committee on Special Education (CSE) without your child first receiving RTI services. This written referral to the CSE should state that you are asking the school district to evaluate your child to determine if he or she needs special education services. You should list all your concerns regarding your child's educational difficulties. You, the parent, can always make a referral for your child. Your child's teacher or a professional in your child's school, doctors, or judicial officers may also request a referral to the CSE. Once a request has been made, the CSE must ask the parent to consent to the evaluation. Before testing can begin, we must have the signed consent for evaluation.

STEP 2. INDIVIDUAL EVALUATION PROCESS

Once the consent for evaluation form has been received by the district, the CSE has 60 days to complete the evaluation. The tests determine what your child's learning difficulties may be and how those difficulties affect his or her participation and progress in the general education curriculum. The evaluation is at no cost to the parent. An initial evaluation to determine your child's needs must include: a physical examination, a psychological evaluation, a social history, observation of your child in his or her current education setting, and other tests or assessments that are appropriate for your child. The results of the evaluation must be provided to the parents.

STEP 3. DETERMINING ELIGIBILITY FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICES

Once the evaluation is completed, you will be invited to a CSE meeting to talk about the results. The CSE, of which the parent is a member, decides if your child is eligible to receive special education programs and/or services. In order to be eligible, a child must have a disability that affects his or her ability to learn. The members of the CSE meeting include but are not limited to the parents; a general education teacher and a special education teacher; a representative of the school district who is qualified to provide or supervise special education; an individual who can interpret the instructional implications of evaluation results; the student, if appropriate; other persons having knowledge or special expertise regarding the student. As a parent, you have the right to invite anyone to the CSE meeting.

STEP 4. INDIVIDUALIZED EDUCATION PROGRAM (IEP)

When your child is eligible for special education services/programs, the CSE must develop a plan to meet your child's needs, called the Individualized Educational Program (IEP). Things to be considered when developing the IEP: Your child's strengths; your concerns for your child's education; evaluation results; test or assessment results; and any unique needs related to the child's disability.

STEP 5. IMPLEMENTATION AND ANNUAL REVIEW/REEVALUATION

After the CSE meeting has concluded, appropriate follow-up is necessary to ensure proper implementation of the IEP.

1. **Notice and Consent.** Parents should receive a notice and a copy of the evaluation report and documentation of eligibility.
2. **Implementation.** The Board of Education must arrange for the implementation of the IEP with no delay. All the recommendations made during the meeting should be implemented according to the timeline specified on the IEP. A copy of the IEP must be provided to the parents. Teachers and other service providers must receive a copy to be informed of their responsibilities.
3. **Annual Review.** At least once a year, the CSE will review the IEP. The meeting may be requested sooner at a parent's request. The child's parents, teachers, and school service providers are invited to the meeting.
4. **Reevaluation.** Each student with an IEP should be re-evaluated every three years. A reevaluation may also be conducted if conditions warrant one or upon request of you or your child's teacher. Prior to any testing, the parent's "consent to evaluate" is required. A CSE is then convened to discuss the results and to ensure that the child is receiving the proper services.

Please understand that in order to meet a child's needs, we want to ensure a thorough evaluation process. As a result, the initial referral to special education is not always a fast process. We also understand this is a lot of information to go through and is overwhelming. Please don't hesitate to call or email if you have any questions about this process or if you have concerns about your child's academic performance.

Social-Emotional Support

It's not uncommon for many people to feel anxious, worried, or stressed right now. In fact, a recent study showed that 4 out of every 10 adults in the United States have experienced anxiety or depression during the COVID-19 pandemic. Schools across the nation are experiencing similar things with students. The Barker Central School District recognized these concerns and has taken action to support our students, staff, and families.

Recently, four new staff have joined the Barker Learning Community to support those experiencing social-emotional learning challenges. Miss Breier, a certified psychologist, has been working closely with Mrs. Annable and is poised and ready to take over when Mrs. Annable retires. Mrs. Riley, Mrs. Bannister, and Mrs. Blask join us from Orleans-Niagara BOCES and are available to meet with students throughout the week. Mrs. Riley, a social worker, can be a great connection between families and the school. She can also provide resources for students and families regarding mental health concerns. Mrs. Bannister, a mental health counselor, can provide group and individualized counseling as well as conduct conflict resolution mediations with students. Mrs. Blask, a trained behavior specialist, works with both students and staff when students are having a difficult time in classrooms. She can provide skills and strategies to de-escalate difficult situations and can help students with coping skills and social skills. We also have our two school counselors, Mrs. Lakeman (grades 7-9) and Mr. Gendrue (grades 10-12), available for help.

All six staff are excellent resources should you or your child(ren) need to talk to someone. Please don't hesitate to reach out with any questions or concerns you may have. We are here to support you.

Capital Work Updates

We are continuing to work through our energy performance contracts related to lighting, HVAC, weatherproofing, and solar. Much of the HVAC, weatherproofing, and lighting work has been done or will be complete by the time you read this. We expect any remaining indoor work will be done in early winter and outdoor work will be complete some time in the spring. The solar array will begin construction soon and we

expect to have that fully operational some time during the winter with full completion in the spring as well. We also expect the Niagara County Sheriff's Office to begin construction of the radio tower this winter with a completion also in the spring time. Lastly, the renovations on the District weight room have begun and we hope to be finished with that work in the middle of January.



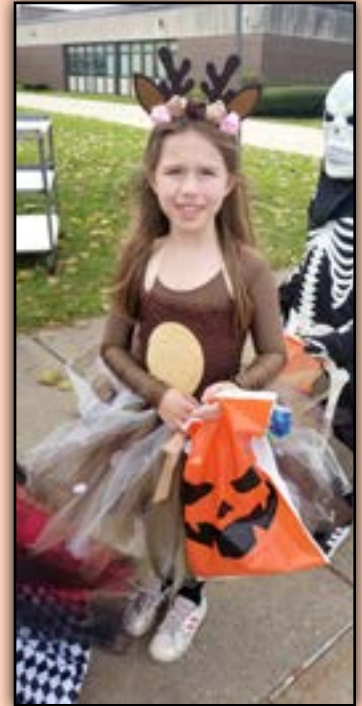
District Committees Formed

Harris Wins National Merit Scholarship

In late September, Mr. Carter, Principal at Barker Central School, announced that Genevieve Harris had been named a Commended Student in the 2022 National Merit Scholarship Program (NMSC). A Letter of Commendation from the school and National Merit Scholarship Corporation, which conducts the program, was presented to Genevieve.

About 34,000 Commended Students throughout the nation were recognized for their exceptional academic promise. Although they will not continue in the 2022 competition for National Merit Scholarship awards, Commended Students placed among the top 50,000 students who entered the 2022 competition by taking the 2020 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT).

"Those being named Commended Students have demonstrated outstanding potential for academic success," commented a spokesperson for NMSC. "These students represent a valuable national resource; recognizing their accomplishments, as well as the key role their schools play in their academic development, is vital to the advancement of educational excellence in our nation. We hope that this recognition will help broaden their educational opportunities and encourage them as they continue their pursuit of academic success."

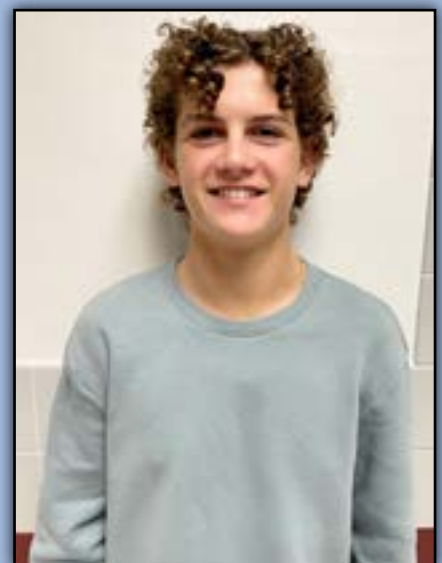

Important Community Education Information

- **Doctor's Certificate of Health:** A physical examination is suggested prior to participating in physical fitness classes.
- **Eligibility:** In general, district residents and non-residents who are 18 years of age or older may enroll. High school students may enroll in any course with instructor approval and parental permission, and the understanding that no credit toward graduation will be granted.
- **Senior Citizens:** Senior Citizens, residents ages 55 and older, will be provided admission at 50% of the regular fee to all school-sponsored events if they present a Barker Central School District Senior Citizen Card. Non-residents will be required to pay the full admission fee. Registration forms must be submitted. Proof of age is required. In order to take advantage of senior citizen fee discount for courses and some special events, you need a Barker Central School Senior Citizen Card. You may receive this card by coming to the Barker Central School Superintendent's office and registering.
- **Registration:** Mail registration. Early registration protects against having to cancel due to insufficient registration. Please avoid disappointment by enrolling early. Registrants can assume they are officially registered unless notified and should begin attending classes on the scheduled starting date. You may register at the first session of class.
- **Is Class Canceled?** Whenever school is closed during the day due to inclement weather, no classes will be held that evening. Listen to local radio stations WBEN-AM 930 or WLVL-AM 1340 or TV Channels 2, 4 or 7 for school closings. If inclement weather begins later in the day, listen to local radio stations for announcements. Whenever possible, we will utilize the Blackboard Connect system to notify registered students in the event of a cancellation as noted above. Please be sure to provide a valid phone number for this purpose. Do not call the school. When a class cannot be held due to an illness or for other reasons, it is the instructor's responsibility to see that class members are notified. Canceled classes will be rescheduled by the instructor.
- **Material Cost:** Additional fees will be charged in classes where materials are used. These are to be paid by the second session.
- **Refunds:** Total refunds will be made only if a class is canceled or filled. Transfer of tuition to another course can be arranged where size of class permits. No transfers after second class meeting. No refunds after classes begin.
- **No Smoking:** Barker Central School is a non-smoking facility.
